

International trend: large increase in Ph.D.s



- 35% increase between 2000-2020 (OECDcountries)
- Consequence: harder competition and high use of temporary employments



Small grants & Seed money

- Small grants to fund different activities also during your PhD
 - Training or teaching
 - Building networks
 - Travel to conference or collaborators
 - Fieldwork or pilot research
 - Organize conferences or meetings
 - Outreach initiatives
 - Develop mobility
- Small grants help build your CV and develop grant writing skills
- Use small grants as part of your career strategy – functional pieces to a big puzzle







- The Strategic Programme for International Research (SPIRE) Seed money *
 - Seed funding to initiate and develop new international research collaborations as a foundation for project proposals for external funding.
 - Annual deadline, March
- <u>UiB Idea</u>
 - Seed funding for developing and testing innovative ideas with societal impact, up to 100.000 / 500.000 NOK
 - · Annual deadline, February

Funding through UiB partners - examples

- CHARM-EU
 - Seed funding for academic collaborations with CHARM partners (up to NOK 50.000)
 - Annual deadline, October
- Research exchange with University of Washington
 - <u>Deadline</u>: Ongoing
 - Amount: Cover travel costs
- Nordic Centre, Fudan University (Shanghai, China)
 - Funding for research visits 2-4 weeks, covering expenses up to € 400 per week
 - No deadline
- The Nansen Fund
 - Funding for research equipment, travel, publication, scientific assistance
 - Max 50.000 NOK, annual deadline January
 - PhD students can only apply for funding as part of a larger project



Small grants Scholarships

Selection of other funding opportunities

- <u>Erasmus+ staff mobility for training</u> (e.g. take methods course abroad)
- <u>Erasmus+ mobility for teaching</u> (teach a course abroad)
- Research Council of Norway: Funding for Research Stays Abroad (3-12 months)
- <u>Fulbright Norway</u> (scholarships during and after PhD)
- <u>University of the Arctic</u> <u>North2North</u> (Short visits max 14 days)
- The Norway-America Association (NORAM) (exchange programme 3-12 months)









Early Career Grants

Fellowships or research projects to fund your own job

- Eligibility: do you qualify?
- Independence: Lead yourself or lead a team?
- Mobility: Are you willing to leave Bergen?
- Prestige: Big grants and low success rates.

Key: understand the funders motivation and how that fits your career perspective

Non-profitable / Charity foundations


- Fund research aligned with the scope of the organization's interests
- Promoting a research agenda

Examples:

- <u>The Kavli Trust Programme on Health research</u> funded research on mental health in children and adolescent (2017-2024)
- <u>Trond Mohn Research Foundation</u> support research and initiatives that promote research at the University of Bergen.
 - TMF Starting Grant programme: Aid UiB in recruiting excellent young researchers and give them the opportunity to lead a research project

Who Can Receive Funding?

Trond Mohn Research Foundation gives grants towards research and research supporting activities at the University of Bergen (UiB), Haukeland University Hospital (HUS) and the University of Tromsø, and other Norwegian research institutions who cooperate with institutions in Bergen. The foundation also gives grants to support translational research at UiB and HUS.


The Foundation contacts relevant partners itself, either directly and/or indirectly through calls for applications. In both cases, the process leading up to a possible allocation comprises a number of steps, generally as follows: call for applications/invitation to apply, consideration of applications with external quality assurance, meetings/interviews and signing of agreement.  - 1-2 years abroad and 1-2 years in Norway.
- Researcher Project for Early Career Scientists (FRIPRO)
 - 4-10m NOK, 3-4 years
 - 2-7 years after PhD
 - No deadline



The purpose of this call is to give researchers the opportunity to pursue their own ideas and to lead a research project within the topics specified in the call.



Up to NOK 30 million for research for and about the education sector

Funding is available for research on and about the education sector. Funding is available for projects relating to teaching and learning, the content and forms of assessment of education, professional education, educational technology, governance and organisation of the education sector, and the role of the education system for the individual and in society and working life. The call is open for projects on all levels of the education system, from kindergarten to higher education and competence in working life. Projects that look at transitions between levels are also relevant.

The aim is to generate high-quality research that is of particular interest to actors and stakeholders related to policymaking, administration and fields of practice in education, learning and competence development. The projects are intended to contribute to knowledge-based development. We encourage projects that are interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary when this serves the purpose.



EU funded research

Programs most relevant for early career scientists are found in the Horizon Europe framework programme for research



Postdoctoral Fellowships – comparable to RCN FRIPRO Mobility Grant

2. European Research Council (ERC)

Starting Grant – comparable to RCN FRIPRO Early Career Scientists and TMF StG

Evaluation criteria in EU and RCN are similar to make Norway more competitive in Europe.







MSCA Postdoctoral Fellowship

Main objectives: mobility and career development

- 0-8 years after PhD
- Any nationality, any field
- Deadline: Annually, September
- 2-3 year postdoc fellowship
 - European Fellowship (2y; € 267 418)
 - Global Fellowship (2+1y)
- Moving country is mandatory. European Fellowship: to an EU MS/AC state
- Host institution and supervisor is required



ERC Starting Grant

Main objective: Ground-breaking research to move the research frontier.

- From 2027 calls:
 2-7 0 10 years after PhD for StG
- Any nationality, any field
- Deadline 2027 call: Autumn 2026
- **€ 1.5 million** for a period of **5 years**
- Individual researcher + team (you become the supervisor)
- EU MS/AC host institution



Timeline and planning

- It may take one year from the call deadline to your project can start if you are successful.
- What do you need funds for
 what are the funding opportunities?
 - Resubmission & Upcycling?
- When do you need the funds → when do you need to apply?
- Planning is important: one helpful tool is using a Career Development Plan

Why career development planning matters



Clarifies your career goals

Helps you define both short-term and long-term objectives – spanning research ambitions and professional growth



Outlines concrete steps to reach your goals

Includes planning when to complete relevant courses, apply for scholarships or pursue other development opportunities



Strengthen self-awareness and ownership

The process enhances your understanding of your own competencies and fosters a stronger sense of agency in shaping your career path

Career development plans

A career development plan shall be prepared, specifying the competencies the doctoral candidate is expected to acquire. The institution is responsible for ensuring that the career plan is followed up and that the candidate has access to career guidance throughout the doctoral education.

Unofficial translation of § 3-19 in the Regulation to the University and University College Act (Forskrift til UH-loven)

Formulating a career development plan

A career development plan should

- Help you reflect on personal and professional aspirations
- Define steps to achieve these goals
- Identify and address potential challenges along the way
- Ensure systematic documentation of competencies and achievements
- Create space for continuous reflection and adjustment

It is a living document that should follow you throughout your career

It is an addition to your PhD project description
